Dear students, parents, guardians and staff,

We are quickly approaching the holiday season where we can spend time with our families and friends and celebrate the coming of a new year. The start of the school year has been tremendous and in the Seaquam way, students and staff have participated and excelled in a number of student-led endeavours that demonstrate how we continually relate classroom teachings to practical applications and connections to real world experiences. I am always impressed with the number of opportunities our staff provide our students to showcase their learning.

This year, our staff have immersed themselves in bringing our school goal to life on the topic of mental wellness. We have focused our Professional Development Days on Mental Wellness topics that focus on how to best support students in class and for staff's personal wellness. As has been announced, our staff will be implementing the Mental Health Curriculum at Seaquam based on the work of Dr. Stan Kucher. http://teenmentalhealth.org/schoolmhl/wp-content/uploads/2015/06/DRAFT-6-2015-Version-New-<u>Design.compressed.pdf</u> Dr. Kucher created this curriculum in response to the growing mental health issues youth are experiencing in their lives. According to Dr. Kucher's research, the onset of many mental health issues in youth occur between the ages of 14 and 15, so the recommendation is to implement the curriculum in grade 9. We will have a conference in mid-April where students will be experiencing the curriculum over 4 half days. Most impressive, we have 30 staff members who have committed to being facilitators of the curriculum during the conference. I am so proud of how our staff have embraced the need to implement this initiative to educate our students on mental health issues.

In addition, PAC requested that we provide parents/guardians with a presentation on the Mental Health Curriculum so that they can follow up at home to continue the conversation. At the last PAC meeting on December 2nd, Mr. Ryan Birt, educator and parent, presented on his experiences of implementing the curriculum in North Vancouver and provided a summary of the major themes that students will experience at the conference. This presentation was extremely informative and provided further information on where parents can look to access more information on the curriculum. The presentation was well received by those in attendance.

Connected to our mental health goal is the implementation of Flex Time at Seaquam that allows students to make choices about their learning. We are piloting Flex Time currently and are taking a mindful approach to how this initiative is impacting student wellness and learning. In conversation with many students, the informal feedback seems to be supportive. We will be conducting surveys in the new year to formally obtain feedback on the effectiveness of Flex Time from students, staff and parents/guardians.

The first term report card was posted on Thursday, December 12th through Parent Connect. This is an opportunity where parents/guardians obtain an understanding of their child's progress in each of their courses. The end of a reporting period should be a time of reflection, goal setting and action planning based on the results of the report card. The report card data needs to be used in a process for improvement or maintenance. Students must take the responsibility of working through the improvement process to create a plan for success. The part of the process that tends to break down over the course of a term is the execution of the plan. Students need to be committed, with the support of their families, to their scheduled activities in order to create positive routines. In meeting with families regarding report card results, the same themes seem to come up over and over again. The themes include committing to an organizer (paper-based or electronic), regular attendance and establishing a focused study routine at home. Ultimately, it comes down to creating positive work habits at school and at home.

My Education Conversion – January 2020

The Delta School District will be converting to the My Education student record database to be in line with all other school districts in B.C. The software will be integrated into our system slowly where we will start with teachers only entering attendance and the final marks in June.

The changes, at this time, that will impact parents and students is that students will be given a new student number to be in line with the software requirements, student course selection for the 2020-21 school year will be performed in My Education and there will be a 9:30am start on January 6th (first day back from Winter Break) to allow teachers time to familiarize themselves with the program and to set up their classes for attendance entry.

Our Life Skills Music class gave their first performance of the year on December 18. This concert featured students performing holiday and non-holiday music with drumming, a variety of percussion instruments, dancing, and hand bells.

This year Seaquam Music students have been our participating in our second year of VSO Connects, an amazing program offered by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. The program includes Master Classes and workshops with VSO musicians, attending an open rehearsal and concert at the Orpheum, and a rehearsal with Andrew Rusk, the Assistant Conductor of the VSO.

In January, we begin the busiest part of our concert season with concerts at all four elementary schools in the Seaquam family (Cougar Canyon, Sunshine Hills, Pinewood, Heath), hosting District Music Night, Kiwanis Jazz Festival, Spring Concert and our annual spring tour. The Seaquam Math Department has a strong history of excellence in mathematics contests. This past November, senior students participated in the Canadian Open Mathematics Challenge (COMC), sponsored by the Canadian Mathematical Society. Starting in February, the University of Waterloo contests will begin. Students in grades 9, 10, and 11 will write the Pascal, Cayley, and Fermat (PCF) contest, respectively. In April, grade 12 students will be invited to write the Euclid contest and students who scored well on the PCF will be invited to write the Fryer, Galois, and Hypatia contests. In May, grade 8 students will have an opportunity to participate in the Gauss contest. Registration for all of these contests will be through students' Math teachers. Crack The Code

The 4th annual Crack the Code Competition returns to Seaquam on February 3rd, 2020. Crack the Code is a puzzle-hunt/escape room styled competition that takes place in the school where the objective is to solve a number of puzzles, with each puzzle leading to a different location of the school, or leading one step closer to the final solution.
